What do Amateur Radio operators do during and after disasters?

Amateur Radio operators set up and operate organized communication networks locally for governmental and emergency officials, as well as non-commercial communication for private citizens affected by the disaster. Amateur Radio operators are most likely to be active after disasters that damage regular lines of communications due to power outages and destruction of telephone, cellular and other infrastructuredependent systems.

How do Amateur Radio operators help local officials?

Many radio amateurs are active as communications volunteers with local public safety organizations. In addition, in some disasters, radio frequencies are not coordinated among relief officials and Amateur Radio operators step in to coordinate communication when radio towers and other elements in the communications infrastructure are damaged.

What are the major Amateur Radio emergency organizations?

Amateur Radio operators have informal and formal groups to coordinate communication during emergencies. At the local level, hams may participate in local emergency organizations, or organize local "traffic nets" using VHF (very high frequencies) and UHF (ultra high frequencies). At the state level, hams are often involved with state emergency management operations. In addition, hams operate at the national level through the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES), which is coordinated through the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and through the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES), which is coordinated through the American Radio Relay League and its field volunteers. In addition, addition, many hams are involved in Skywarn, operating under the National Weather Service.

Is Amateur Radio recognized as a resource by national relief organizations?

Many national organizations have formal agreements with the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) and other Amateur Radio groups including:

Commitment

If you are interested enough to join a local club or repeater group then you have a commitment. Involvement on your part if you plan on becoming part of that club/group. Agreement on your part if you want to be accepted.

Choose which one fits you and your commitment. Duty, Dedication, diligence, faithfulness, resolution, loyalty, obligation, responsibility, and involvement. Surely one of these words fit you and what you stand for:

- A. Duty; moral obligation, acting out of duty. The compulsion felt to meet such obligation.
- B. Dedication; the act of dedicating or the state of being dedicated. Selfless devotion, serve the public with dedication and integrity.
- C. Devotion; ardent, often selfless affection and dedication, as to a person. The act of devoting or the state of being devoted.
- D. Decision; the act of reaching a conclusion or making up one's mind. Firmness of character or action; determination.
- E. Diligence; Earnest and persistent application to an undertaking; steady effort; assiduity. Attentive care; heedfulness.
- F. Faithfulness; adhering firmly and devotedly, as to a person, a cause, or an idea; loyal. Worthy of trust or belief; reliable. Consistant with trust or actuality; a faithful reproduction of the portrait.
- G. Resolution; the state or quality of being resolute; firm determination. A resolving to do something. A course of action determined or decided upon.
- H. Loyalty; the state or quality of being loyal. Feelings of devoted attachment and affection: My loyalties lie with my club/group.
- I. Obligation; the act of binding oneself by a social, legal, or moral tie. A social, legal, or moral requirement, such as duty, contract, or proise that compels one to follow or avoid a particular course of action. The service or favor for which one is indebted to another. The state, fact, or feeling of being indebted to another for a special service or favor received.
- J. Responsibility; the state, quality, or fact of being responsible.
- K. Involvement; to contain as a part, include. To engage as a participant; To influence or affect.

Obligation, responsibility, duty; these nouns refer to a course of action that is demanded of a person, as by law or conscience. Obligation usually applies to a specific constraint arising from a particular cause: "Then in the marriage union, the independence of the husband and wife will be equal, their dependence mutual and their obligations reciprocal" (Lucretia Mott). Responsibility stresses accountability for the fulfillment of an obligation: "I believe that every right implies a responsibility; every opportunity, an obligation; every possession, a duty" (John D. Rockefeller, Jr.). Duty applies especially to constraint deriving from moral or ethical considerations: "I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support its constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies" (William Tyler Page).

Faithful and loyal – these adjectives mean adhering firmly and devotedly to someone or something, such as a person, cause, or duty, that elicits or demands one's fidelity. Faithful and loyal both suggest undeviating attachment; these words are often interchangeable, though loyal is the term often applied to political allegiance: a faithful employee; gave faithful service; a loyal companion; a loyal citizen.

I guess you can see where I'm coming from with this article. Your self pride and worthiness can be greatly enhanced and you can become a very useful tool for that particular club/group with only a little commitment. They are depending upon you and your skills certainly that's not much to ask. You'll see a big reward in your heart, try it.
